







Background

The Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) identifies and prioritizes the health needs of individuals in the healthcare organization's service area, which includes portions of counties in Wisconsin (Crawford and Grant) and Iowa (Clayton and Allamakee).

As required by the Affordable Care Act and IRS Code 501(r)(3), all non-profit hospitals must conduct a CHNA every three years and adopt a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) to address those needs. This process guides community benefit, outreach, and service efforts.

Similarly, under Wisconsin Statute 251.05, health departments must regularly assess and report on community health, develop policies, and engage stakeholders in creating a CHIP every five years—supporting the mission of Crawford County Health & Human Services to promote life-long health and well-being. Notably, the Crawford County Health and Human Services department has aligned their planning with Crossing Rivers Health's required three-year CHNA and CHIP cycle, furthering cohesion and collaboration between public health and healthcare systems in addressing shared priorities.

Process

In 2024, regional healthcare and resource partners collaborated to conduct a CHNA, resulting in this Community Health Improvement Plan. The plan outlines goals and strategies to address service gaps, barriers, and wellness needs identified through the assessment.

Our approach draws from models such as County Health Rankings & Roadmaps—focused on health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and the physical environment—and Healthy People 2030, which emphasizes equity, health literacy, well-being, and Social Determinants of Health (SDOH). The Prevention Institute's Spectrum of Prevention, with its six-level comprehensive framework for enhancing public health efforts, was also used to guide the development of the CHIP.

Through collective impact and resource alignment, partners aim to create measurable progress in the identified priority areas.

Population

The Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) focuses on addressing health needs identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and improving the health and wellbeing of individuals that live in Crawford County and the Crossing Rivers Health service area, which includes communities outside of Crawford County, WI.
